~ During the Little Entrance, chant the Resurrectional Apolytikion. The Eisodikon (Entrance Hymn) is "O come, let us worship... save us, O Son of God, Who art risen from the dead..." After the Little Entrance, chant the apolytikia in the following order:

HIEROMARTYR CLEMENT, BISHOP OF ANCYRA

Saint Clement, who was from Ancyra in Galatia, was the son of an unbelieving father, but a believing mother whose name was Sophia. At first he lived as a monk, later he became the bishop of his city. He suffered so many things in confession of the Faith in Christ, that the time of his sufferings and struggles stretched out over a period of twenty-

eight years. Finally he and Saint Agathangelus (who was from Rome)

were beheaded together during the reign of Diocletian and Maximian,

in the year 296.



Building a Strong Domestic Church by Abbott Tryphon

Less than a hundred years ago, prior to electricity and central heating, most families gathered in parlors, spending evenings reading, sewing, and having family conversations. The notion that everyone would retreat to bedrooms, kitchens, or dens, separating themselves from other family members, was unthinkable. The communal nature of the family was natural. Before the coming of television families would gather for evenings in the living room, where children would play games with their parents. That a time would come where everyone would run off to separate rooms for the evening, was unthinkable. Evenings spent together as family is important, for these moments not only build a bond between parents and their children, but serve as important times in which to share family values. The old saying, "a family that prayers together, stays together" was a truism that is often forgotten. Family meals are also important for building strong moral and spiritual foundations in children. Sitting around the dinner table is a great time for parents to develop strong bonds of trust with their children. Dinner is a perfect time for talking to your children about their friends, or school activities. Family members that disperse throughout the house for the evening, are likely to function as autonomous entities, where family bonds are unlikely to be developed. The domestic church, which has been such an important part of Orthodox Church tradition, can not be developed in a family where meals, prayer, and social life are all in separate parts of the home. The center of the Orthodox domestic church must be the icon corner, that place where the family gathers for their morning and evening prayers, and where they partake in the daily scripture readings as called for in the Church calendar. When children are raised in such an environment they will remain strong in the faith. These are the children who will live their faith into adulthood, and deliver the Orthodox Faith into the next generation. THE VERY. REV. EPIPHANY 2022 – BLESSING OF HOMES

The central sign of our acceptance of God's sanctification of the creation is the blessing of the homes of faithful Orthodox Christians.

We bless homes:

- **a.** To reveal the home as what God created it to be, a way to heaven.
- **b.** To rid the home of every evil.
- c. To know that the family is a small church unit in Christ, to consecrate the home and all activity in it to God.

d. To have the home and all who live in it with the fullness of God. Only the Church reveals what life is, and she alone is the Kingdom of God on earth. The Church lives within Christ, revealing Him to us. As the Church, we sprinkle blessed water throughout the home, as we chant, *"When you, 0 Lord, were baptized in the Jordan, the worship of the Trinity was made manifest. For the Fathers voice bore witness to you and called you His Beloved Son, while the Holy Spirit, in the form of a dove, confirmed these words. 0 Christ our God, who has appeared to us and has enlightened the world, Glory to you."*

The priest consecrates the home to the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit in this act, the Church blesses, reveals and sanctifies.

When the priest comes for the house blessing, please adhere to these guidelines:

1. Have as many family members there as possible.

2. Setup a place for prayer, in the dining room or kitchen, with an icon and a candle. 3. Print the first names of those for whom specific prayers are to be offered, including

all family members on a sheet of paper, making a clear distinction between living and departed.

4. Take this time to get to know Father Elia better, asking any questions you may have.

5. If a child needs some time to talk to Father, respect his/her privacy and make the opportunity.

6. Make Father Elia aware of any special needs you may have.

7. Tell Father Elia about any family members who are in nursing homes or in need of a visit

Please remember that Father Elia will be making many visitations. A lengthy social visit may not be possible at this time. If you would prefer a visit outside the Epiphany season, please let Father know.
