remarkable story that comes to us from the spiritual treasury of the saints is that of Pelagia the Penitent. She was a woman of striking beauty who led a life of debauchery in the city of Antioch. The world was her home: she was an actress and dancer, dressed in the finest silk, covered with jewels, scented with the most fragrant of perfumes - and not a thought about sin, soul or salvation.

But one day her entourage passed by the Church of the Martyr Julian, where there was a man of great sanctity and zeal for Christ, Bishop Nonnos. He happened to be preaching outside the doors, and Pelagia heard him. She was stricken in heart at the message of the Gospel, and could not contain her tears as she sobbed at his feet. The Bishop soon exorcised her, baptized her, fed her the Bread of Life, and rejoiced at the rebirth of this penitent soul.

News of her transformation spread quickly throughout the city, and a crowd gathered at the church. They complained to the Bishop and beseeched Pelagia to return to her former way of life. But she persevered in faith. Then she took her fancy clothes, jewelry and gold and gave it all to the Church for distribution to the poor. She freed her servants, bidding them to escape from the bondage of this sinful world.


On the eighth day after baptism, when she laid aside her white Baptism robe, Pelagia dressed herself in a simple garment of repentance and made her way to the Holy Land. There, near the Garden of Gethsemane, she dwelt in a solitary cell and was never seen again in Antioch. She was found one day by an ascetic of the desert, asleep in Christ, and then was buried by the faithful. People came from near and far to praise God for this sinner who became a saint.

~ During the Little Entrance, chant the Resurrectional Apolytikion. The Eisodikon (Entrance Hymn) is "O come, let us worship... save us, O Son of God, Who art risen from the dead..." After the Little Entrance, chant these hymns in the following order:

ABOUT THE DIVINE LITURGY

The Divine Liturgy expresses the entire Christian faith in a continuous song of praise and prayer addressed to God. It is focused on God, not on us. There is nothing just for amusement or entertainment.

Since much of the service is the same every week, worshippers know it and can participate personally, either by singing along or just by prayerful attention. Worshippers are surrounded by icons (pictures of Christ and the saints), which remind us that we are participating, while on earth, in the worship of all the angels and saints in heaven. The entire service (except for the sermon) is sung. The words are all from Scripture or ancient Christian texts. Please follow the service in the books available in the pews. Weekly changes will appear below and marked with a corresponding letter in the service book.

TODAY'S FEAST SUNDAY, OCTOBER 8[™] 2023 THIRD SUNDAY OF LUKE

PELAGIA THE RIGHTEOUS

This Saint was a prominent actress of the city of Antioch, and a pagan, who lived a life of unrestrained prodigality and led many to perdition. Instructed and baptized by a certain bishop named Nonnus (Saint Nonnus is commemorated Nov. 10), she departed for the Mount of Olives near Jerusalem, where she lived as a recluse, feigning to be a eu-

nuch called Pelagia. She lived in such holiness and repentance that within three or four years she was deemed worthy to repose in an odour of sanctity, in the middle of the fifth century. Her tomb on the Mount of Olives has been a place of pilgrimage ever since.

THOMAS THE APOSTLE OF THE 12

The name Thomas means, "twin." He was one of the Twelve, a Galilean by birth. Sophroneus (not the famous Patriarch of Jerusalem [7th Century, celebrated March 11], but a friend of Jerome's), quoted also by Jerome, says that Saint Thomas preached to the Parthians, Pesians, Medes, Hyrcanians, Bactrians, and neighbouring nations. According to Heracleon, the Apostle died a natural death; according to other accounts, he was martyred at Meliapur His temb was known by Saint Jo

counts, he was martyred at Meliapur His tomb was known by Saint John Chrysostom to be at Edessa in Syria, to which city his holy relics may have been translated from India

Disciples & Apostles

Most of us are quite familiar with the twelve disciples of our Lord Jesus Christ. But in addition to the original twelve, Christ selected Seventy Disciples and Apostles sent forth with the task of preaching. The Gospel of Luke (Luke 10: 1-16) describes the calling and the sending forth of the Seventy Apostles. With the passage of time, others were added to their number by the Holy Apostles, who, with the accompaniment and assistance of the Seventy, went about preaching the Gospel in various lands. Although their number eventually exceeded seventy, they were all nonetheless referred to as "of the Seventy" out of reverence for the number of Apostles which the Lord chose.

Most of us don't think of ourselves as "Apostles". Many of us probably consider ourselves rather ordinary when it comes to faith, and certainly not extraordinary. The Lord, however, doesn't call us to be ordinary. He calls us each to be extraordinary. He calls us not only to be servants but to be leaders. And He doesn't call us just to be Disciples, but to be Apostles.

Not everyone will be able to cast our demons or heal the sick. But the Lord gave each of us something of power and influence. There are many people whose "power" is in their humility, or honesty, or work ethic. There are people who speak with powerful conviction about the faith. And there are still others who give a powerful witness of their faith with their patience, perseverance and how they live their lives. God has given each of us the ability to learn about the things of faith, to be a Disciple. And He has given each of us a way to lead others to Christ, giving each of us then the foundation to be good Apostles.

Be a Disciple today! Be an Apostle today!

In Closing some words from Saint John Chrysostom.

"Nothing is more frigid than a Christian who is indifferent to the salvation of others. Indeed, I wonder if such a person can be a true Christian. To become a disciple of Christ is to obey his law of love; and obedience to the law brings joy beyond measure and description. Love means to want the best for others, sharing with them the joy of love."
